EAGLE BAY FIRE DEPARTMENT

Open Fire Bans

Category 2 & 3 Open Fire prohibitions are now in effect for the Eagle Bay area.

ONLY Category 1 Campfires are permitted.

A Category 1 fire (campfire) is defined as:

- Any fire in one single pile no larger than 0.5 metres high by 0.5 metres wide (any fire larger than this is considered a Category 2 fire).
- Is lit, fuelled or used
Used by any person for recreational purposes, or
by a First Nation for a ceremonial purpose.

Safety and Regulatory Rules

To burn a Category 1 fire legally and safely in BC, you must adhere to the following rules:

- **Water & Tools:** You must have at least 8 litres of water or an approved firefighting hand tool (like a shovel) available at the fire site at all times.
- **Attendance:** A person must be watching and patrolling the fire at all times to prevent it from escaping.
- **Extinguishing:** The fire must be fully extinguished, and the ashes must be cool to the touch, before you leave the area.
- **Fuel Break:** You should establish and maintain a fuel break (cleared area) around the fire.

Jeremy Wozniak and his wonderful wife, Geneva Whynot, moved to Eagle Bay in 2020 in search of a place that they could raise their little family in a beautiful surrounding with amazing neighbours.

From the young age of four, Jeremy had his eyes set on becoming a firefighter. While sitting in on a local TV station's morning children's show in Calgary called Buckshot and Benny, he was asked what he would like to be when he grew up. His response, a fire truck. This plan did not pan out for obvious reasons. In the spring of 2021, Jeremy had driven past the bulletin sign outside the fire hall for the 200th time, pondering whether this was the time to join. One day in March the sign had read, "A woman's place is in the firehall". This sign was in recognition of international woman's month. He thought that this sign was the sign that had showed that the Eagle Bay Fire Hall was not a cliché rough and tough political club. Rather, it is a place that brings together community members from various backgrounds to work as a team to obtain a common goal. Immediately, Jeremy found the training challenging and rewarding.

Over the past five years he has been fairly busy. Most recently, Jeremy has become our newest Captain. Some of the other areas that he has become heavily involved in are: CSRD Protective Services Joint Health and Safety Committee, training instructor, live fire technician, wildland engine boss and structural protection, and investigation.

When Jeremy is not at the fire hall, the Shuswap Regional Fire Training Centre, or out on wildfire deployments with his fire family, he can be found digging around in the garden with his children, planting flowers and playing with livestock. Jeremy is a 19-year electrician by trade. One of his most favourite things to do is to look up on a map where a waterfall is and go on a hike with his children and wife.

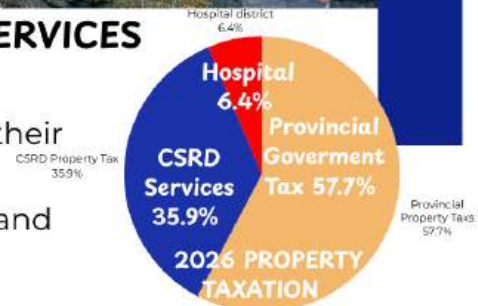

2026 PROPERTY TAXATION CSRD SERVICES VS PROVINCIAL SERVICES

By June, Area C residents should have received their property tax notices. As your Area C Director, I have strived to increase taxation transparency and explain Area C taxation in a digestible manner.



The non-CSRD portion of property taxes accounts for almost 2/3 of property taxes collected. Although Area C spending has decreased by 1.13% over the last two years, the provincial portion (School, Provincial Rural, and Police taxes) has increased from 1.9558/\$1000 in 2024 to 2.1225/\$1000 this year, representing an increase of 8.5%.

CSRD Area C Official Community Plan (OCP) Amendment Application

The owner of a property located in Sunnybrae, designated LH – Large Holdings, applied to redesignate the property from LH to RR – Rural Residential to facilitate building 12 additional dwelling units (modular homes) for long-term rental. The LH designation allows a maximum density of one single detached dwelling (SDD) per 10 ha, and the RR designation allows a maximum density of one SDD per ha. OCP policies allow for one secondary dwelling unit (SDU) for each permitted and constructed SDD. The RR designation would allow 15 SDD and up to 15 SDU. As the property was not located in the OCP secondary settlement area as well as other concerns the CSRD Board did not support the requested amendment.
